- 36% increase in sponsorship
- Organisation staffing changes including periods of time without filling roles.
- Revenue from participation increase. This growth was not expected nor budgeted for.
- Diligent fiscal management of all budgets.

Objective

Both the short term and long-term objectives of the Club are to promote the health and wellbeing of members of SUFC through the provision of programming Rugby activities and facilities and through supporting programs of SUFC.

Strategy for achieving objective

To achieve this objective, the Club aims to provide high quality Rugby programs and facilities to the SUFC members. Achieving our goal, from the participation level through to the high-performance level, will help our members, whatever their social or cultural backgrounds, become the best possible versions of themselves both on and off the fields of play.

Principal activities

During the financial year the principal activities of the Club was to promote community rugby sporting programs. There were no significant changes in the nature of the activities of the Club during the financial year.

Key Performance Measures

The Club measures its own performance through the use of both quantitative and qualitative benchmarks. The benchmarks are used by the directors to assess the financial sustainability of the Club and whether the Club's short-term and long-term objectives are being achieved.

Review and results of operations

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2023

Note 1. Significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted.

The Club has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of Preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB'), the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and New South Wales legislation the Associations Incorporation Act 2009, the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and associated regulations, as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

Historical Cost Convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Club's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

Revenue Recognition

The Club recognises revenues as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Club is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the Club: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2023

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Revenue from contracts with customers (continued)

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, and any potential bonus receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraints continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Sales revenue

Events, fundraising, and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Donations

Donations are recognised at the time the pledge is made.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the Club satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements. If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the Club is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until those conditions are satisfied.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Income Tax

As the Club is a Not-for-Profit organisation in terms of subsection 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Club's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2023

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Current and non-current classification (continued)

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Club's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are always classified as non-current.

Trade and other receivables

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less cost of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Club prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible the estimated future cash outflows.

Defined contribution superannuation expense

Contributions to defined contribution superannuation plans are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Fair value is measured using assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstance and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2023

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financial activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable for, or payable to, the tax authority.

Going concern

Accounts prepared on a going concern basis and SUFC has financial stability to meet its obligations and continue as a business for the foreseeable future.

Note 2. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions.

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgement and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenues, and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to respective notes) within the next financial year are disclosed below.

Coronavirus (COVID -19) pandemic

Judgement has been exercised in considering the impacts that the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has had, or may have, on the Club based on known information. This consideration extends to the nature of the products and services offered, customers, supply chain, staffing and geographic regions in which the Club operates. Other than as addressed in specific notes, there does not currently appear to be either any significant impact upon the financial statements or any significant uncertainties with respect to events or conditions which may impact the Club unfavourable as at the reporting date or subsequently as a result of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The Club determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written do.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2023

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 1, the liability for employees benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.



FOUNDATION REPORT

THE SYDNEY UNIVERSITY FOOTBALL CLUB FOUNDATION (SUFCF) WAS ESTABLISHED IN 2003 TO SUPPORT THE ONGOING RUNNING OF THE CLUB AND TO ENABLE IT TO COMPETE AT THE HIGHEST LEVEL.

A donor program was established and has been in existence for 20 years. The proceeds from the program have accumulated a dedicated capital fund, the balance of which stands at \$4.3 million on 30 June 2023. A portion of the Fund's investment earnings is distributed annually to the Club for the specific purpose of supporting the Club and its players in achieving the highest levels of success in both academic and sporting endeavours. The Fund is professionally managed by Ord Minnett Ltd, in accordance with an approved investment mandate and an agreed asset allocation of Australian and International equities, interest bearing securities, term deposits and cash, under the overall direction of the SUFCF Investment Committee (IC) and members of the SUFCF Board of Directors. My thanks to Andrew Murray and Anthony Teasdale and the Ord Minnett team and to the members of the Investment Committee comprising Jim Cooney, Tony Mulveney, Jared Baker and Patrick Allaway who gave their time and effort during the year and to Paul Reid and Tony Mulveney of KPMG who kindly donate their time and expertise to the Foundation to manage and complete the financial accounts.

The fourth third Annual Legends Lunch was certainly a highlight of 2023 when we honoured SUFC Wallabies, Drs Gregg Burrows and Phil Crowe and also Roger Davis. The Legends Lunch continues to be popular event amongst SUFC alumni and it is sold out each year. Our thanks are also due to Ray Dearlove, who conceived the idea of the Legends Lunch and acts as secretary of the Foundation.

2023 was a difficult year for Australian rugby and the same can be said for your club, where 1st Grade did not qualify for the finals of the Shute Shield for the first time in a while and the club did not win the Club Championships. Steps have been taken to improve the performance of the club in 2024.

2023 also saw the changing of the guard at the end of the Financial year in June 2023 when I stepped down and handed the reigns of chairman to long-serving Foundation Board member, Jim Cooney. I know that Jim is excited by the opportunity. Jim will lead the update of The Sense of Union project, working with Dr Tom Hickie, who authored the original.

On behalf of the Foundation, I would like to express my thanks for the generosity of our valued donors who have made donations over the past 20 years. It is important to note that the Club continues to need the support of more donors. Following on from the excellent platform laid by previous Chairmen, it has been a great honour to serve as Chairman of SUFCF. I am privileged to have such a capable Board and I greatly appreciate the efforts in recent years to raise additional funds to provide greater financial stability to the Club. I am confident the legacy we have built will continue to grow to ensure the Foundation continues to support the broader goals of the Club.

There are currently 93 active members of the Friends. All Members are encouraged to attend matches.

When first formed, the Friends had two specific mentoring goals:

A BIG THANK YOU, AS ALWAYS, TO SUFC FOR THE ONGOING SUPPORT AND RESOURCES THE CLUB'S MEDICAL TEAM ARE PROVIDED. WITHOUT THIS WE WOULD NOT BE ABLE TO PROVIDE THE LEVEL OF SUPPORT WE HAVE LONG BEEN ABLE TO.

This year the medical team consisted of the familiar faces of George Guyatt - Head Physiotherapist, Chris Russell - Colts Physiotherapist, Dr Tom Cooney - Club Doctor and we said goodbye to Lizzy Donnelly but welcomed Hussain Jamali as the Women's Physiotherapist. After a great year with the Women's team, we sadly farewelled Huss as he moved on to warmer pastures, making a move to the sunshine state. We wish him the best up in Queensland.

SERIOUS INJURIES OF SEASON 2023

Fortunately, this year's serious injury list was shorter, and very happily involved far fewer ACL injuries than last year. As per the injury report from 2022, we had a huge amount of contact-based ACL injuries that were very likely due in part to the immense amount of wet weather.

In season 2023 we welcomed back many of the players that suffered season ending injuries last year. Saul Lewis, Rob Ireland, George Clark, Sean Hasegawa and Kalani Pilcher all returned for the club after extensive periods of rehabilitation.

Players injured this season that were unable to return were:

Kalani Pilcher - ACL injury. His work ethic and diligence during his rehabilitation from an ACL injury in 2022 was a testament to Kalani's desire to return this year, very unfortunately his return was cut short by another ACL injury.

Miles Minto - Miles had been taking part in rehabilitating himself from a knee issue when an unrelated mishap occurred that meant Miles was unable to play this year. He remained in touch with the club and continued his rehab in preparation for 2024.

Kai Roberts - The most injured player of 2023, unfortunately not a lot of luck fell Kai's way this year. After suffering two significant injuries, in one tackle, during colts pre-season camp he had an extended stint in rehab, made a somewhat

smooth return and shortly after, ruptured his pec. Kai is rehabilitating well, and we hope to see him on the field in 2024.

Tom Willson - Ankle. A regular around the club for many years, the big Horse battled an ankle issue that eventually required surgical intervention. This prevented his return.

Will Ravoka - Fractured ankle. As one of the tougher players at the club it was concerning to see Will go down with what appeared to be a significant injury. Initially these fears were allayed when he got up, hopped off the field smiling and laughing - as always. Sadly, he had broken his ankle. Will had surgery to fix his ankle and has been rehabilitating since.

Papillon Sevele - ACL rupture. Since Papi's injury he has been very committed to the process of preparing himself for what we hope is plenty of time on the field in 2024.

Lachie Thorpe - Turf toe. Despite turf toe being an injury to the big toe and often having its significance downplayed, it is often a hugely debilitating injury. Sadly, Lachie was unable to return this year. It is common enough that we will see 1-2 players have their season ended by this injury.

Bryn Edwards - Fractured ankle. Bryn has happily made his return to rugby via the Waratahs U19's program.

Angus Truman - Shoulder dislocation. Angus underwent surgery that meant he was unable to return this year. He is tracking well for season 2024.

Jay Spencer - Biceps rupture. One of the great props, Jay made an unexpected return to the club this year after some time in the Subbies wilderness. Unfortunately, his year was cut short when he ruptured his biceps. He underwent surgery to repair his injury and luckily for him, his biceps will be looking good come summer.

Jordan Mouscas - Fractured ankle. Jordan managed to avoid surgery and has worked his way through his rehabilitation program to be ready for season 2024 preseason.

The medical team would also like to mention players that spent substantial time in rehab this year. They were, Aidan Wearne, Alex O'Reilly, Angus Allen, Ben Fakira, Digby Cooke, Dre Chou Lee, Ed Bell, Elijah Leota, George Clark, Hamish Cressey, Harry Jeffrey, Hugh Bokenham, Mali Manukia, Joe Scwhager, Luke Ratcliff, Max von Appen, Rob Hedderman, Sione Taufui and Will Clements.

SEASON 2023 INJURY STATISTICS

This year we saw a more consistent spread of injuries across the board, unlike the large spike in severe knee injuries last year. We continued to have a significant amount of AC joint injuries (tip of the shoulder) that are typically frustrating but unavoidable injuries that occur in rugby matches. We fortunately saw a reduction in avoidable soft tissue injuries this year, and promisingly – having adjusted the way we monitor our injuries – we have confirmed that those that take part in all the rugby program has to offer, are less injured. This is a sign that the strategies to build player resilience that coaches, strength and conditioning staff and the medical team implement across the year are beneficial to players longevity throughout the season.

Below is a breakdown of injuries by body part and the length of time that players took to full training from their injuries.

The medical team in consultation with strength and conditioning staff strive to see a reduction in avoidable injuries across the club. There will continue to be a focus on preventing avoidable soft tissue injuries as these injuries typically cause substantial time loss and are more preventable than many other injuries. Fortunately, the SUFC program when utilized by players to its full potential, is undoubtedly beneficial for those players as far as preventing the injuries mentioned above. As medical staff we encourage all players to involve themselves as much as possible, from as early as possible, to avoid having to spend any time on the sidelines with the medical team.

Season 2024 is just around the corner and the medical team are gearing up for a big preseason. The staff, players, supporters, and sponsors of SUFC make this a great club to be a part of and we always look forward to being involved at training, throughout the weeks in medical clinics and on the sidelines on Saturday. We wish SUFC and all the players the best for 2024.

Their success is a huge testament to the strength of the group, leadership amongst the players and support of the coaching staff.

JACK SCOTT CUP

With two teams in the Jack Scott Cup we certainly a lot on our plate this season. However, after falling short in last year's grand final, we were more determined than ever to reclaim our spot at the top.

The Blue team kicked off with a tough match against Easts. With most of the team on debut for the Jack Scott Cup, this game showcased an array of new talent and challenged those more experienced players to step up and take lead. Despite the loss, this game provided the Blue team a foothold in the competition and inspired a tenacious work ethic amongst the squad. We saw hard work pay off in Round 7, with Sydney Uni Blue (34) defeating West Harbour (5) in triumphant fashion.
