2025 Financial Commentary

With a successful year financially and commercially, the club invested \$100,000 into the Trilogy Funds portfolio, returning an 8.5% monthly return—supporting a sponsor and positioning SUFC for long-term success.

In FY25, we also repaid \$100,000 towards the \$150,000 SUFG No.2 commitment, effectively paying two years in one due to strong financial outcomes and diligence. The contributing factors to this:

- » Increase in sponsorship & donations.
- » Diligent fiscal management of all budgets.
- » Increased revenue from Finals Lunch

A further surplus of \$12,481 for FY25 and continues SUFC's financial footing into the future to sustain the business. The following key actions have contributed to that achievement:

- » Howden Women's Coaching Scholarship.
- » Continued commitment to SUFG No.2 repayment schedule.
- » Evolvement of medical practices and expert consultants.
- » Capital infrastructure projects.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2025

Note 1. Material accounting policies

The accounting policies that are material to the Club are set out below. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted.

The Club has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of Preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB'), the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and New South Wales legislation the Associations Incorporation Act 2009, the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and associated regulations, as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

Historical Cost Convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Club's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

Revenue Recognition

The Club recognises revenues as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Club is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the Club: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised. Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, and any potential bonus receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2025

Note 1. Material accounting policies (continued)

Revenue from contracts with customers (continued)

The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraints continue until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Sales revenue

Events, fundraising, and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Donations

Donations are recognised at the time the pledge is made.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the Club satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements. If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the Club is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until those conditions are satisfied.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Note 2. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions.

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgement and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenues, and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to respective notes) within the next financial year are disclosed below.

Employee benefits provision

The liability for employees benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.



FOUNDATION REPORT

The Sydney University Football Club Foundation was established in 2003 to support the operational interests of the Club and enable it to compete at the highest level. The Foundation provides direct assistance through donations, scholarships, equipment, facility enhancements wherever possible. It is also committed to preserving and promoting the rich history and heritage of Australia's oldest rugby club.

I extend my sincere thanks to the SUFC Foundation Board members for 2025, David Mortimer AO, Richard Harry, Jarrod Saffy, Katrina Oxenham, David McDuling, David Lyons, Tom Woodcock, Jared Baker and Hugh Frazer. We were delighted to welcome new members this year: Scarlett Dorney, Al Campbell and Dan Farrell. Richard Harry stepped down after years of dedicated service, and on behalf of the Foundation we thank him wholeheartedly for his commitment.

Your Foundation Investment Committee for 2025 comprised Tony Mulveney, Jared Baker, David Mortimer AO, Katrina Oxenham, and newly appointed Dan Farrell, with myself as Chairman. Throughout 2025, the Foundation held Board meetings during February, April, June and October, aligned with Investment Committee sessions.

We also acknowledge the invaluable involvement of Ord Minnett, particularly Malcolm Wood and Anthony Teasdale, for their detailed quarterly investment reports and ongoing management of the Foundation portfolio.

The Fund is professionally managed by Ord Minnett Ltd, under an approved investment mandate and asset allocation strategy, including Australian and international equities, interest-bearing securities, term deposits, and cash – overseen by the Investment Committee and Board.

As of October 2025, the Foundation portfolio stands at \$4.9 million, up from \$4.45 million in August 2024, with \$230,000 cash flow after tax and expenses for FY25 – similar levels expected for FY26. We thank Paul Reid, Tony Mulvaney, and the KPMG team for ensuring compliance with ASIC requirements and the Foundation Trust Deed.

This year, the Foundation distributed two tranches of \$92,500 to SUFC, an increase from \$80,000 in 2024. In accordance with the Foundation Charter, these funds supported key pillars: player welfare, pathways and

development, mental health and wellbeing, community engagement, development of players, coaches, administrators and volunteers, and partnership recognition.

Key initiatives this year included the successful awarding of the Country Scholarship, to Eamon Doyle from Kiama, through a partnership with St John's College, which generously matched donor contributions. This program will continue annually, thanks to the leadership of Tom Woodcock.

The Foundation also focussed on the Sense of Union 2nd Edition Project, working with author Tom Hickie with assistance of Harriet Schmude and Will Lintott to update SUFC's historical record, with completion anticipated in 2026.

The Foundation proudly hosted the newly named 'SUFC Foundation Welcome Dinner' at St John's College, welcoming all new players and families, reinforcing our "One Club" vision with David Mortimer AO representing the Foundation in my absence.

Our major annual Legends Lunch was another highlight, attracting 187 attendees, including our Gold Members, and celebrating SUFC's heritage. This year's panel featured **John Rouen** (1968 Premiership Captain), **Bob Egerton** (Wallaby #695, 1983 Premiership winner), and **Jim McInerney** (1983 Premiership winner), interviewed by Andrew Coorey. We gratefully acknowledge Southern Highlands Brewing, Lord Howe Island Distilling Co, and Elegancy Catering for their support.

We were also honoured to welcome special guests Gordon Bray, David Thodey AO (USYD Chancellor), Michael Hawker and Al Campbell, both of whom were named in the nominated 2025 Legends Team. Their presence added to the sense of occasion and connection across generations of SUFC.

Looking ahead, the Foundation has an ambitious plan to double its corpus and invest significantly in key areas, including the Women's program, Coaching, Juniors, and the Country Scholarship, ensuring SUFC's continued success.

On behalf of the Foundation, I thank our Board, Investment Committee, and all supporters for their commitment. We look forward to another successful year of supporting SUFC in 2026.

As we reflect upon the 2025 campaign, there is no denying that across several areas of the program we saw a step forward from 2024. The challenge ahead is clear: understand the gaps, work hard to rectify these, and find people who are committed to a cause greater than themselves.

Premiership Success: 3rd Colts

I wish to acknowledge the efforts of 3rd Colts in securing their premiership. It was wonderful to see not only the quality of the performance—which was well above 3rd Colts standard—but how the entire club across all three programs supported the team on the day and got around the players to celebrate their well-deserved success.

Administrative Excellence and Professionalism

With over nine teams in our senior program running simultaneously, this cannot happen without the time and expertise of so many people, many of whom work diligently in the background.

MEDICAL REPORT

Overview

The 2025 season demonstrated meaningful progress across all SUFC programs, with overall injury numbers stabilising and key markers such as soft tissue recurrence, return-to-play (RTP) timelines improving. Continual collaboration between S&C, medical, and coaching teams, alongside structured triage and player education initiatives, contributed to a more proactive and efficient medical environment.

Grade - Summary

- » Total Injuries: 171 (Reduction of 7% from 2024)
- » Injury Rate: 6.1 per round (similar to 2024)
- » Time-Loss Days: 572 total
- » Season-Ending Injuries: 5 (Reduced from 15 in 2024)
- » Common Injuries: Knee (16), ACJ (10), Hamstring/Galf (10 combined), Concussion (13)

Key Insights

- » Significant reduction in soft tissue injuries reflects improved conditioning and high-speed running exposure.
- » Low recurrence rate (only 2 reinjuries) indicates strong rehab and RTP systems.
- » Chronic load-related injuries (MTSS/Achilles) decreased markedly, showing better body-weight and load monitoring.
- » Contact-related injuries, especially ACJ and thumb/knee trauma, remain high and largely game-situation dependent.
- » Major improvements in interdepartmental communication but ongoing issues with players bypassing medical clearance for RTP.

2026 Focus

- » Expand pre-season injury prevention and concussion awareness seminars.
- » Reinforce reporting protocols to eliminate unreported injuries.
- » Increase student/trainer numbers to reduce medical room congestion.
- » Continue integrated medical-S&C testing to identify at-risk players early.

Women's - Summary

- » Total Injuries: 48 (↓38% from 2024)
- » In-Season Injuries: 33 (355 total days lost)

Medical Review 2025 season

- » Season-Ending Injuries: 4
- » Re-Injuries: 0 (Reduced from 1)
- » Most Common: Concussion (9), Ankle (6), Hamstring (5), Wrist/Forearm (2)
- » Concussion Incidence: 28.2/1000h – higher than elite norms but lower mean severity (11 days vs 48–50 days in elite women's rugby).

Positives

- » Significant drop in total and overuse injuries (10 → 5).
- » Faster RTP times (majority <3 weeks).
- » Clearer communication between physio, S&C, and coaching staff via shared injury spreadsheet.

Areas to Improve

- » Concussions remain high; early reporting and education are essential.
- » Clinic congestion still problematic; need for dedicated strapping area.
- » Financial constraints and dual-sport participation complicate load management.

2026 Priorities

- » Mandatory baseline testing and concussion education.
- » Improved rehab compliance tracking and triage attendance.
- » Separate strapping space for female athletes to ensure comfort and efficiency.

Colts - Summary

- » Total Injuries: 64 (Reduced by 5% from 2024)
- » Season-Ending Injuries: 6 (ACL x2, Shoulder x2, Stress fracture x1 and ankle x1)
- » Common Injuries: Ankle sprains (8), Hamstring (2), Shoulder/ACJ (14), Concussion (5), Knee (4)
- » Average RTP: 10.5 days
- » Reinjuries: 2x recurrent ankle sprains, 1x recurrent hamstring 12 weeks apart

Key Observations

- » Injury incidence around exams increased during both training and games – ACJ's + ankle sprains.
- » Enhanced triage attendance led to earlier intervention and reduced time loss.
- » Rehab running being structured, approached and intervention lead from both S&C + physio assisted significantly in RTP times.

2026 Recommendations

- » Emphasise communication education and accountability from pre Christmas.
- » Dedicated student trainer for Colts to improve taping efficiency.
- » Introduce group rehab sessions to improve adherence and camaraderie with Grade to give them something to achieve and attain toward.

Conclusion

Across all SUFC programs, 2025 reflected strong progression toward a unified, evidence-based medical framework. Injury rates remained stable despite expanded squads, and time-loss duration declined across most categories. A reduction in season-ending injuries and improved rehab outcomes underscore the club's evolving professionalism.

Key growth areas include concussion management, communication consistency, and logistical support. With continued collaboration between medical, S&C, and coaching teams, SUFC is positioned to enter 2026 with performance readiness, and player welfare at the forefront.

1ST GRADE REPORT

The 2025 season tested our resilience like no other. While the final results on the ladder didn't always reflect the exceptional dedication shown by our players, coaches, and volunteers, this campaign revealed the true heart of the Sydney University Football Club.

Through a perfect storm of challenges - unprecedented injury tolls, weather-disrupted training blocks, and representative commitments - the squad demonstrated an unwavering grit that has become the foundation of our culture.

Context: A Season of Constant Change

The statistics tell a compelling story of a year defined by flux. We suited up **54 different players** for First Grade, including **22 debutants** who stepped up into the heat of the Shute Shield. We were unable to field the same starting XV twice throughout the entire 18-round season, and 80% of our scheduled training sessions required last-minute modifications due to circumstances beyond our control.

Significant disruptions included:

- » A brutal injury toll between Rounds 1-18, particularly stripping our depth in the centres and backrow.
- » The **Lions Tour** impact on representative player availability post-Super Rugby, making it difficult to find consistency.
- » Limited squad cohesion as new combinations were forced to integrate with minimal training time together.

On-Field Highlights & Defining Moments

Despite the obstacles, the season was punctuated by moments of brilliance. We opened with tremendous promise, securing a memorable comeback win against Randwick and a comprehensive Round 4 victory over Gordon that showcased our true attacking potential.

As the season progressed, our "road warrior" mentality emerged. We took gritty away wins at Eastwood and West Harbour, but the standout was Round 16 at Granville - a physical, hard-fought victory over the Two-Blues that marked our first win at their home ground in five seasons.

Even the "near misses" spoke to our character. Two overtime losses to the Two-Blues and Norths were heartbreaking, but they showed a side that refused to yield. In Round 13 at Coogee, despite a stop-start affair plagued by 31 penalties, our pack and backline showed remarkable resilience, never giving an inch in a contest that epitomized the "Uni" spirit.

Leadership and Individual Honours

Nathaniel Ponozzo captained the team for 12 rounds and statistically ranked as the leading lock in the Shute Shield. His understated, "lead by example" style transformed our squad culture before a freak thumb injury unfortunately cut his season short.

Connor O'Shea celebrated his **100th Grade Game** milestone while captaining the side through the final six rounds. Playing through injuries and often out of position, Connor perfectly captured our ethos: "No matter what team we put on the field, their commitment and fighting spirit cannot be questioned."

After finishing 7th, the season before, and with a young and exciting group, Project Bravo was created – to chase what many might consider an unrealistic goal.

Project Bravo

We opened the season strongly with a win over West Harbour, followed by our first victory in recent years against the three-time 3rd Grade champions, Randwick. Returning Sydney University enforcer Byron Hodge joined the coaching team alongside myself and Uni Rugby legend Ray Hudd.

As with all seasons, consistency was still a work in progress. We suffered losses to the Rats, Gordon, and Easts, but the team continued to create opportunities and track in the right direction.

As the second half of the season commenced, we had the chance to show our growth. After Gordon handed us an early loss – and a few “Uni” chants – it was satisfying to return the favour later in the year, showing them how far we’d come and how to handle a win with class. Back at home, we delivered a statement 73–0 victory over Souths, kicking off a strong run of performances.

One of the season’s highlights came against Norths, another “Uni”-chanting side, where we played arguably our best half of rugby all year. A combination of aggressive defence, a dominant set piece, and an attack that could strike from anywhere put us up 35–5 at halftime.

Challenges kept coming – none bigger than an undefeated Manly side, who we handed their first loss of the season. From a 50-point defeat earlier in the year against Easts, we came agonisingly close to turning the tables at Woollahra, going down by just one point.

We closed the regular season in style, celebrating Jack Stampford’s 150th game for Uni and delivering our second shutout of the year at No. 2 Oval.

Finals Series

Heading into the final stretch – our “last three peaks” – we faced familiar opposition in Norths and Gordon during the semi-final and preliminary final. Both matches saw decisive team performances and big impacts from our finishers, earning us the chance to represent Sydney University at Leichhardt Oval.

In a traditional, physical, and attritional grand final, Easts held onto a narrow lead to claim the Henderson Shield.

4TH GRADE REPORT

The 2025 season began with high expectations, fuelled by a solid core of experienced veterans and a fresh group of young men graduating from the Colts program. The impact of the wider grade group training sessions – which started as early as November – was clearly visible in the superior fitness and skill levels shown by the players as we approached the opening round.

Season Foundations and Early Momentum

The regular season kicked off strongly with convincing wins over West Harbour and a quality Randwick side. However, we were soon met with a dose of reality following a narrow seven-point loss to Warringah, a draw with Gordon, and a heartbreaking one-point defeat to Easts in consecutive weeks.

Resilience and the ANZAC Day Challenge

The draw against Gordon was a unique test of the group's character. After originally being postponed, we were notified at 5 PM on ANZAC Day – following a solid team-building session – that the match would be played the very next day at 12 PM on a back field in Chatswood. While the early kick-off proved a challenge even for the great clubman Jack Stanford, we were grateful for his eventual arrival and second-half contribution.

The Mid-Season Winning Streak

The narrow loss to Easts served as a catalyst, firing the group up to a new level. We then embarked on our best stretch of the season: an eight-game winning streak against the Two Blues, Easts 5ths, Norths, Wests, Gordon, Souths, Randwick, and Norths again.

A true highlight of this period was playing three games in just ten days before the June long weekend. The final match of that stretch, played on a cold, dark Tuesday night at St Andrew's Oval, saw the group produce a dominant 48–12 "thumping" of Norths. The positive culture and lack of complaints during this gruelling period were exemplary.

Finals Campaign: Peak Performance and Reflections

We entered the finals in 4th place after a patchy end to the regular season caused by injuries and shifting commitments. However, the first round of finals saw us produce our best rugby of the year against 3rd-placed Warringah. We controlled every aspect of the game, from the set piece to our strategic kicking, securing a win that was more dominant than the final scoreline suggested.

In the Preliminary Final, we came up against a clinical and well-drilled Easts side. Despite a spirited second-half momentum shift and three tries, simple errors and the "bounce of the ball" went against us. Easts ultimately moved on to win the Grand Final, leaving us with a clear understanding that at the highest level, the small details are what get exposed.

Season overview

3RD COLTS REPORT

The 3rd Colts delivered a phenomenal 2025 season, finishing as Minor Premiers and ultimately Premiers, winning the Bill Simpson Shield in dominant fashion. The team recorded an impressive 15 wins and only 1 loss during the regular season, scoring 502 points while conceding just 172, with a commanding +330 points difference. Their consistency and discipline were rewarded with 16 bonus points, and they finished atop the ladder with 76 competition points.

The post-season was equally emphatic. The team romped through the finals with victories over West Harbour (50–31) in the semi-final, Manly (67–10) in the preliminary final, and a clinical 41–10 win over Randwick in the grand final, avenging their only loss of the season from Round 2. Across the finals, they posted 158 points for and only 51 against, showcasing the systems, fitness, and mindset that defined their year.

Review of the Season

The hallmark of the 2025 campaign was a deep commitment to "the process", that is, playing Sydney University Rugby with intent and clarity. Every member of the team bought into the identity and systems that SUFC stand for:

- » Starchy defence with fast linespeed, with time and two in the tackle.
- » Playing in the right areas through smart kicking and relentless kick chase.
- » Sustained pressure in the A Zone through composure and ball control.
- » Work hard and early: getting into position first, then resting second.
- » Set-piece dominance that gave a platform for all areas of the game.

The process not only underpinned the team's success, but ensured that every player contributed. Notably, only two players, Liam Walsh (7 tries) and Hunter Fogarty (5 tries), featured in the competition's top 20 try scorers despite being 73 points clear of the next best for score. This speaks to their standards and structure-driven performance that defined their play. This was showcased in the grand final when up by 31 points and only 6 minutes remaining, John Cameron-Murphy torpedoed a clearing kick from 22 to 22 resulting in a Randwick knock on and another opportunity to score a try.

Defining Moments

Two matches stand out as turning points in the team's journey:

- » Round 10 v West Harbour (26–15 win): In a physical and testing encounter, the group was challenged: "Are you a premiership team, or just a team that wants to win a premiership?" The response to that challenge shaped the mindset for the remainder of the season.
- » Round 13 v Randwick (31–28 win): The long-anticipated "Slime Week" was more than a theme, it was the first time the club song was sung with full voice.

Leadership and Individual Honours

- » Captain: Levi Gooding led the side with charisma, composure and clarity. He ensured standards were met and exceeded, and united the group across all weeks of the campaign.
- » Vice Captains: Liam Walsh provided relentless energy and voice from halfback, while Joey Tagg offered calm and connection throughout the backline.
- » Best Forward: Seb Ball brought immense physicality and presence to the tight five. The hard-running, hard-hitting lock from the Illawarra coast was uncompromising in defence and attack.
- » Best Back: Charlie Boman showed enormous growth throughout the year, offering outstanding organisation from fullback. His absence from the grand final due to injury was deeply felt, but his impact across the season was undeniable.

The team was expertly guided by:

- » Forwards Coach: Kazuhiro Okamoto
- » Team Manager: Kandy-Taline Fielding

Together, they cultivated a culture of accountability, resilience and unity.
